Through a combination of cultural competency trainings, interpreter trainings, research projects, community coalition building, and other services, the CCHCP serves as a bridge between communities and health care institutions to ensure full access to quality health care that is culturally and linguistically appropriate."

CCHCP offers an on-line store for resources and books, training programs, interpreter information, and information about research programs. We have found "Communicating Effectively Through an Interpreter: An instructional video for health care providers" to be very useful. It's an investment (\$150.00) but it is quick, to the point, and helpful.

You will also find a document called **Medical Interpreter Code of Ethics** at this site (<u>http://www.xculture.org/interpreter/overview/ethics.htm</u>) You may find this document useful as a guide for staff who often find themselves in the position of interpreting.

All 4 booklets can be downloaded free at this link. Booklet 3, *Adult Immunizations* and Booklet 4, *Resources for Physicians and Patients* may

be the most relevant for your clinics. Below are two excerpts:

"Racial and ethnic disparities clearly exist in both pediatric and adult immunization rates, but the extent and cause of these disparities are different. Accordingly, physicians may need to employ multiple strategies to effectively eliminate all pockets of need in their patient population. One overarching principle, however, is the delivery of culturally sensitive care. Among other things, this can involve placing pamphlets in multiple languages in clinic waiting rooms, knowing how to access translators, and being knowledgeable about community-based services available to different racial and ethnic populations. It is especially important for physicians to be sensitive to the cultural beliefs and practices of their patients and to understand their patients' barriers to immunization." (p.4)

"The primary barrier to increasing immunization rates in adolescents and adults is the high number of missed opportunities to vaccinate these populations during contacts with physicians. Many patients report that physicians neither ask about nor offer vaccines during their medical visits. (p. 9)
